The BA (Hons) History introduces students to the full range of history from medieval to modern, from local to global.

Our campus is centred in history, set alongside the iconic Tower of London, the busy river Thames, and bustling St Katharine Docks, where people and goods embarked and arrived on their way to and from the British Empire and the wider world. Fascination with the deep history of Britain and the world and the global connections that created the modern world runs through our History degree. As well as mastering key skills that are essential for historians: conducting research, critically assessing sources, using digital tools and writing for different audiences, from the scholarly to the public, you will explore the impact of history on modern advancements, and learn to draw on your knowledge of the past to make informed decisions. You will also relate your historical studies to current issues. including global superpowers, economic and societal transformation, historical impacts on contemporary British society and the economic impact of history across the globe.

Our diverse and socially-engaged history curriculum embraces the full range of history, challenging the traditional canon with a critical perspective. WHAT IS AN ELECTIVE?

Courses on the University Course List are available as electives, subject to timetable, pre-requisites, and availability*. Electives provide students with the opportunity to create a bespoke programme of studies.

PATHWAYS

NU London's broad range of electives allows for students to gain significant experience in disciplines outside their main area of study. Students can apply for official recognition of this experience in their University documents upon graduation, in the form of a 'pathway'. Pathways can be achieved by completing three courses, associated with a given discipline or theme, across at least two levels.

A wide range of 'discipline' pathways are available, including Art History, Creative Writing, Computer Science, Data Science, Economics and Mathematics. We currently offer two interdisciplinary 'thematic' pathways, Political Thought and Sustainability. Depending on the number of electives available within your degree programme, it may be possible to complete two or even three pathways before graduation. Your academic Adviser will be able to recommend the electives you will need to acquire a given pathway.

* University Courses List Conditions The optimal /elective courses that run in each academic year are subject to change in line with faculty availability and student demand, and may be capped or be unavailable in the timetable, so there is no guarantee every optional/ elective course will be available every year. Where a course is set to run, students for whom it is an option will typically be given priority over students for whom it is only an elective



ACCELERATED US MASTERS DEGREE

The accelerated Masters allows students to complete a UK undergraduate degree and a Masters degree from either the UK or another global campus within as little as four years. Credits from select NU London electives will be transferable into the US Masters degree, decreasing the time required for the programme and the overall fees payable (alongside the husky or alumni discount).

TEACHING METHODOLOGY

Courses are delivered face-to-face on campus through a variety of engaging formats that can include


As part of our dedication to experiential learning, our assessment approach emphasises the practical application of knowledge and skills in real-world scenarios, ensuring your active involvement and readiness for both professional success and active citizenship. Assessments align with your individual interests, ambitions, and objectives, while also providing valuable opportunities to enhance and refine essential knowledge and skills.

We offer a diverse range of assessment methods, including portfolio assessments, interactive simulations or role plays, collaborative group work, practical exercises, written coursework, comprehensive exams, and engaging presentations. We firmly believe that assessments are not just a way to measure learning, but also a powerful tool for learning. Whether your assessment is formative or summative, you can expect to receive valuable feedback that will inspire and motivate you to continue your learning journey.

Courses at the University are assessed formatively and summatively in a variety of ways, including:

- Written Assignment (e.g. long-form coursework essay; study report; literature review; reflective essay; dissertation)
- Examination (e.g. open book scheduled exam; closed book exam; 24-/48-hour exam)
- Presentation (e.g. oral presentation with accompanying slides; Viva voce)

- Role Play (e.g Moot; consultancy simulation)
- · Practical (e.g. lab skills assessments)
- Artefact (e.g. piece of code or poem with an accompanying report)
- Portfolio (students only have one final, formal deadline, but what they submit includes a series of shorter pieces created and reflected upon and revised across the course)
- Set Exercises (e.g a series of short set exercises distributed across the course)



CONTEXTUAL OFFERS

When we review applications we take into consideration a number of socioeconomic factors, school performance data, and other pieces of information for UK applicants. We give additional consideration to students from specific widening participation groups. This is to recognise the potential of talented students from all backgrounds.

If a candidate meets certain eligibility criteria, we may make an offer lower than our typical entry requirements that recognises the potential of students whose personal circumstances may have restricted achievement at school or college. This is called contextualised admissions.

UK STUDENT VISA

In order to study in the United Kingdom international students may require a visa. If you are an international student who is coming to Northeastern University London to study a programme that is longer than 6 months, you must apply for a Student Visa before coming to the UK. This visa has replaced the Tier 4 visa.



Northeastern University London is licensed by the UK government to sponsor your visa application for all of our programmes.

WORKING RIGHTS FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS WHILST STUDYING

International students studying a full time programme at the University will be able to work part time (max 20 hours) during semester time and full time during scheduled semester breaks.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

If English is not your native language, you will need to demonstrate proficiency in English in order to study at the University. Students must have a good command of English and be able to communicate in an academic environment.

Entry requirements


Students will need to be 18 years of age on the 1st September in the year of entry.

TYPICAL ENTRY REQUIREMENTS


A-levels: AAB. A-level General Studies, Critical Thinking, Thinking Skills and Global Perspectives are not accepted as one of your A-levels. We normally also do not accept native language A-levels. Students studying the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) alongside three A-levels may be eligible for an alternative offer.

IB: 35 points overall or alternatively 6,6,5 in HL subjects (with an overall pass). The overall score of 35 points includes the TOK and the Extended Essay.

BURSARIES

EU STUDENTS

EU, EEA and Swiss citizens with settled status (or Indefinite Leave to Remain or permanent residency) who have been ordinarily resident in the UK or Islands for the three years immediately before the start of their course (unless the residency in the UK or Islands was mainly for the purpose of education) may be considered home students for tuition fees.

The UK and Ireland have agreed that students from Ireland will continue to have home fee status in the UK, under the arrangements of the Common Travel Area.
